The event is due to take place on date and last for 3 hours.

The persons attending the event will be 'Young Farmers' between the age of 10-28 and any accompanying parents/guardians/associate members all of whom will have evidence of membership/links to YFC members.

Christmas Tree Collection	Injury to members and stewards	Members and stewards	<ul> <li>All participants will be asked to adhere to any rules, and these will be followed and enforced for safety reasons.</li> <li>Participants to be warned of uneven roads and surfaces around the route before setting off.</li> <li>Participants requested to wear sturdy footwear, hi-vis vests, gloves and appropriate clothing during the activity and take care when leaving and returning to vehicle between stops. Participants to follow the green cross code.</li> <li>Organisers to request tractors and trailers or vans park in safe locations, avoiding blind bends and off the main road if possible at each location.</li> <li>Participants will be instructed on the preorganised route and the farms/premises to be visited and agree to return to a identified venue for a set time, to ensure everyone's safety. Organisers to write down all participants names and vehicle registration details and the time they set off to ensure a safe return of all participants.</li> <li>The date of the Christmas tree collection will be selected using weather forecast information and in extreme weather conditions, the collections will be postponed to a later date in January.</li> <li>All participants requested to have a road worthy, taxed and MOT'd vehicle and a fully charged mobile phone to ensure their own safety. The organisers/YFYFC will not be responsible for vehicle break downs.</li> <li>At the pre-organised houses, farms/premises participants may be offered refreshments. All participants are expected to decline the offer to prevent illness/food poisoning.</li> <li>All participants are advised against Christmas tree collections, door knocking or entering premises that have not been prearranged or known to the club/district.</li> </ul>	Medium	<ul> <li>Knowing that the decision may be needed to cancel the event all together in the event of a severe weather/flooding.</li> <li>In the event of a near miss, incident or accident, an incident form must be completed and returned to County Office as soon as possible.</li> <li>Do not accept trees taller than 12ft for manual handling safety reasons.</li> <li>Ensure all members are wearing work gloves to prevent pine needle stick injuries.</li> <li>Wear head torches if working in low light or darkness.</li> </ul>	Named person and club
